"Love and relationship will always produce better outcomes than fear and shame." I read these words from The Mystics Would Like a Word by Shannon

K. Evans last week. They struck me as so important in these times of stress and division. She was speaking about Hildegard of Bingen, a mystic who was born in 1098 in Germany. She lived until 1179, and in her lifetime was a theologian, a poet, and was declared a saint and a doctor of the church. She saw the dignity and sacredness of our relationships with each other.

Our relationships with each other define who we are. For Felician Village, relationships define our ministry. Our connection to God and to God's people calls us to continue the healing ministry of Jesus by providing compassionate care that respects the dignity of each person we serve.

The General Curia of the Order of Friars Minor, the Franciscans, published a book on dialogue in 2005. They tell us that living in dialogue is living in a relationship. We are fulfilled in dialogue with God and with each other. In contrast, monologue is a one-way street. There is only one source – no interaction. But we are told that "in the beginning was the Word." Jesus is dialogue and relationship. Dialogue implies listening and accompanies our development as humans. Beauty and goodness are the fruits of our exchanges with each other and with God. Our spirituality includes all of God's creation, all of God's people. Dialogue is not just exchanging words. It is an attitude of faith and a culture of meeting with others. It is conversion, discipleship, and service. We do this all in relationship to creation and to each other. As we continue our progress through Lent, prepare for Holy Week, and celebrate the Resurrection, let us keep in mind how we can continue to be in relationship with each other. Sharing our ideas and experiences, discovering the totality of the other person, and discovering our common core all join to the sacredness of our connections with all of God's people.
